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Upper Goyt Valley Regeneration Project

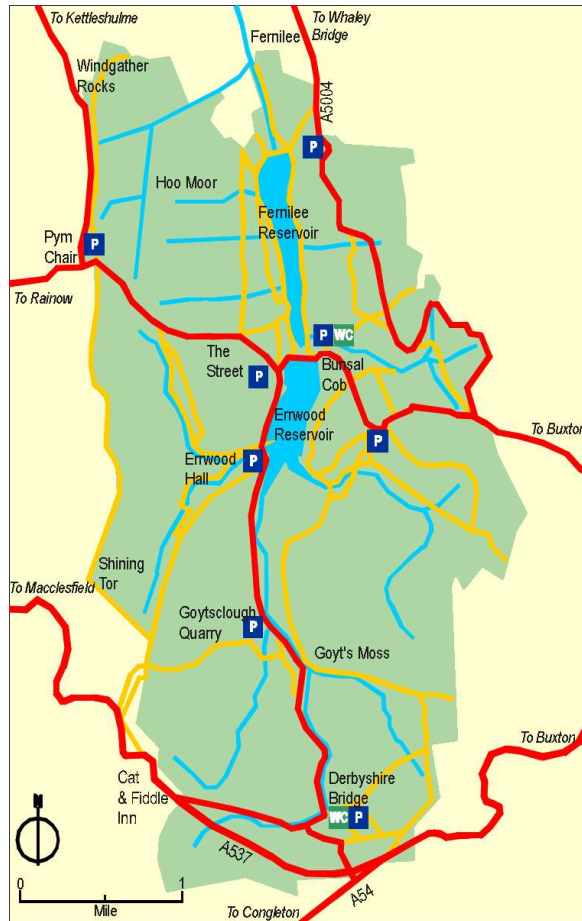


The Forestry Commission, Peak District National Park Authority and United Utilities have commissioned a study of the Upper Goyt Valley. It is being undertaken following receipt of a Project Planning Grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Proposals will be presented for the conservation, enhancement and wider enjoyment of the area over the next ten years.



The Upper Goyt Valley



The Upper Goyt Valley, to the west of Buxton, covers approximately 2,000 hectares. It contains high moorland, river and valley scenery, including the heather and grass moorland pastures, woodland, enclosed farmland, numerous archaeological relics and the remnants of the Grimshaw family estate, including Errwood Hall. The Fernilee and Errwood reservoirs lie at the centre of the area.

Aims and Objects

- The key objectives of the programme are to:
- o conserve or enhance areas or elements of built or natural heritage importance
 - o improve access to the heritage, with opportunities to increase understanding and appreciation of local character and distinctiveness
 - o add to the quality of life through social, economic or environmental projects
 - o meet local needs, enlisting local support, activity, volunteering and engagement.



Proposals will be prepared for improving access to the countryside, traffic management and visitor facilities and for extending biodiversity. There will be an emphasis on sustainability. Proposals could include improvements to car parks, transport, interpretation, ranger and visitor services and the possible extension and improvement of the footpath system.

The project commenced in August 2005 is due for completion in March 2006.
